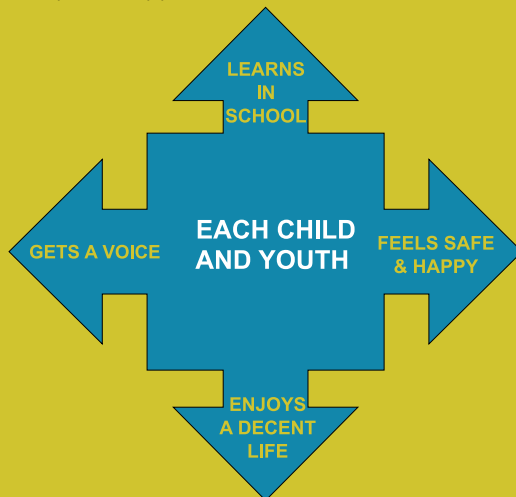
Together, we will continue to advocate for the rights of the children not only to survive but to thrive in the country.

How We Work

At Loo Niva Child Concern Group, we are driven by a shared vision of a Prosperous Nepal where every child and youth can realize their full potential thriving in an environment that is safe, inclusive, and empowering. Our work is grounded in the belief that every child and youth have the right to health, education, protection, and meaningful participation in shaping their own lives and communities

We Pursue this mission by achieving complementary goal:

We aim for *Happy Children and Youth* who are supported by caring families and have unhindered access to quality education, health care, protection services and participation opportunities.



We pursue our mission and goal through four interlinked strategies:

- 1. Empowering Individuals and Communities**
We raise awareness and build the capacity of children, youth, families, and communities to understand and assert their rights. We facilitate their informed access to public services and systems that support their development and well-being.
- 2. Strengthening Duty Bearers and Governance**
By collaborating with government agencies and civil society organizations, we promote responsive, effective, and accountable service delivery systems that uphold the rights of children and youth. We work hand-in-hand with both state and non-state actors to bridge policy and practice.
- 3. Building Solidarity and Advocacy Networks**
We mobilize and connect grassroots voices to national and global platforms through active engagement in networks, coalitions, and advocacy alliances. Our efforts are focused on promoting human rights, social justice, and systemic transformation at all levels.
- 4. Supporting the Vulnerable with Care and Protection**
We provide timely support and protection to children, youth, and families in vulnerable situations offering direct assistance, psychosocial care, and referrals to ensure safety, dignity, and access to opportunities for recovery and resilience.

Key Highlights of 2025: Transforming Children's Lives in Nepal

In 2025, **Loo Niva Child Concern Group** significantly advanced the rights to education, protection, and inclusion for Nepal's most vulnerable children particularly girls, Dalits, and children with disabilities.

Through integrated, community-driven approaches:

- **168+ vulnerable children** accessed education support, while **13 children with disabilities were newly enrolled.**
- **110+ teachers across 38 schools** enhanced inclusive teaching practices.
- **7 Local Child Rights Committees** were strengthened, and **Child Funds established in 2 municipalities**, ensuring local ownership.
- **2,525 parents** were engaged, and **29 families** received livelihood support to sustain children's education.
- **29 child clubs led 102 social actions**, empowering children as agents of change.
- **10 advocacy actions, 26 radio programs, and 5 media publications** amplified child rights issues nationwide.
- **22 children with disabilities received education support**, alongside health interventions and the establishment of a **Disability Help Desk.**

Introduction of Loo Niva

Loo Niva is community-rooted non-governmental organization dedicated to promoting the rights, protection and development of children and youth in Nepal. Established with the vision of creating an equitable and inclusive society, Loo Niva works closely with communities, schools, civil society organizations and government institutions to ensure that children have access to quality education, protection and opportunities for meaningful participation.

The organization focuses particularly on marginalized groups including girls, Dalit children, children with disabilities (CwDs), and children from vulnerable socio-economic backgrounds. Through rights-based programming, community mobilization and policy advocacy, Loo Niva aims to address systemic barriers that prevent children from realizing their full potential. Loo Niva collaborates closely with local governments, youth groups, schools, parents and civil society actors to strengthen community resilience and government accountability. The organization also actively participates in national and international platforms to advocate for children's rights and inclusive development.

With a dedicated team and visionary leadership, we remain committed to creating systemic change through education, protection, and youth empowerment. Loo Niva continues to serve as a catalyst for hope, action, and transformation ensuring that every child not only survives, but thrives with dignity and opportunity.

Loo Niva Programs 2025

Right To Education

Promoting Inclusive and Equitable Education for All Children

Education is a fundamental human right and a key driver of social inclusion and equality. In Nepal, despite progress, many children particularly girls, Dalits, children with disabilities, and those from economically disadvantaged families continue to face barriers to accessing and completing quality education. Loo Niva has been actively working to address these challenges by promoting inclusive education, strengthening community awareness, and supporting vulnerable children through rights-based approaches and collaboration with local governments, schools, and communities.

In 2025, Loo Niva contributed to strengthening education systems and improving learning environments by enhancing the capacity of 110 teachers from 38 schools on child-centered and

inclusive teaching methods. The organization also promoted child-friendly and environmentally sustainable learning spaces in 12 schools and supported the enrollment of 13 children with disabilities, ensuring greater inclusion in education. In addition, 168 vulnerable children received educational support, including learning materials, mentoring, and regular follow-up, helping reduce financial barriers and improve school participation. At the institutional level, child welfare systems were activated, and 110 teachers from 38 schools were trained on inclusive and child-centered approaches. Efforts to promote inclusive education led to the enrollment of 13 children with disabilities.

Through these efforts, Loo Niva strengthened community engagement, improved access to education, and promoted inclusive practices, ensuring that marginalized children have the opportunity to learn, grow, and build a better future.



Empowering Nirjala's Education through Income Support

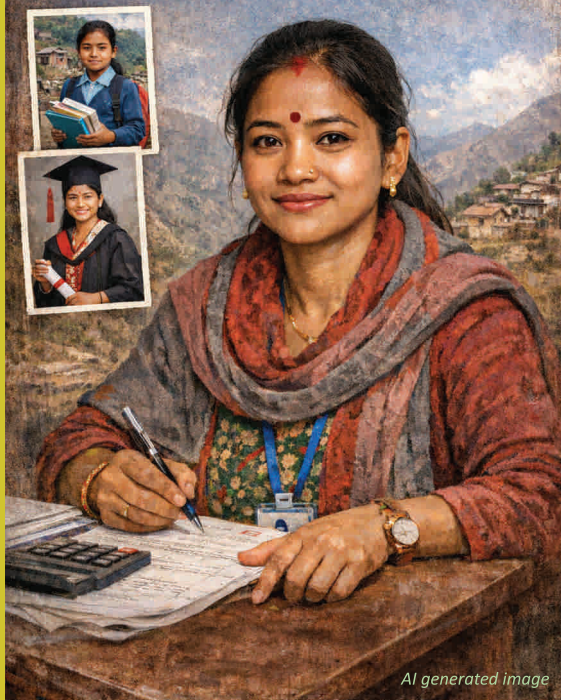
Nirjala, a young girl from a low-income family in Nawadurga Rural Municipality, Dadeldhura, faced serious challenges in continuing her education. Her family relied on small-scale farming and daily wage labor, often struggling to meet basic needs, which affected her school attendance and learning.

With support from Loo Niva, in collaboration with the local government, her family received a goat under an income-generating program designed to support children's education. This simple intervention created a meaningful change. Within a year, the goat produced offspring that the family sold, using the income to purchase school uniforms and learning materials for Nirjala.

With improved resources and family support, Nirjala became regular in school and actively engaged in her studies. She successfully progressed in her education with improved academic performance, reflecting a positive transformation in her learning journey.

This shows how a small, sustainable livelihood support can create lasting impact strengthening family resilience while ensuring children's right to education.

Kajol: A Journey of Grit, Dreams, and Determination



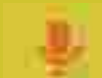
Born into a low-income Dalit family in Jharuwarasi, Godawari Municipality, Lalitpur, Kajol grew up in a context where educational opportunities for girls were limited. Her family struggled to meet daily needs, placing her at high risk

of dropping out of school. However, Kajol's determination and passion for learning set her apart. Recognized by her teachers as bright, disciplined, and focused, she remained committed to her education despite the challenges.

In 2016, Loo Niva selected Kajol for its educational support program for providing essential support such as school supplies, admission fees, and uniforms. This support enabled her to continue her education with confidence and stability.

Kajol successfully completed her Bachelor's degree in Business Studies in 2025. Today, she works as a Finance Assistant of NGO in Jajarkot, where she contributes to empowering marginalized communities while also supporting her own family financially. Kajol's journey is a powerful example of how sustained support and determination can transform a life.

Child Protection

Protecting Children's Rights and Well-being

Child protection remains a core priority for Loo Niva, ensuring that children grow up in safe, supportive, and inclusive environments free from violence, discrimination, and neglect. In Nepal, children especially girls, Dalits, children with disabilities, and those in rural areas continue to face multiple protection risks. In response, Loo Niva has consistently worked to strengthen community-based child protection systems, promote awareness, and support vulnerable children through close collaboration with local governments, schools, civil society, and communities.

In 2025, significant progress was achieved in strengthening local child protection mechanisms. Seven Local Child Rights Committees were reformed, and two rural municipalities established Child Funds, enhancing local ownership and sustainability. Capacity-building efforts reached 261 elected representatives and 297 government officials, while awareness programs engaged over 2,500 parents and 869 children. Child participation was strengthened through 29 child clubs leading 102 social initiatives, and 52 cases of child labour were identified for targeted response.

These efforts reflect Loo Niva's continued commitment to building sustainable child protection systems, empowering communities, and ensuring that every child can grow, learn, and thrive in a safe and nurturing environment.

Community Action Against Child Marriage for Protection

Child marriage remains a significant challenge in rural Nepal, often driven by poverty, social norms, and lack of awareness. In Bhardeu of Konjyosom Rural Municipality, limited understanding of the legal marriage age and its consequences contributed to the continuation of this harmful practice.

With the support of Loo Niva, the Local Advocacy and Monitoring Committee (LAMC) led a community-based campaign engaging parents, teachers, local leaders, and religious figures. Awareness sessions and dialogues helped communities better understand the legal and social impacts of child marriage. A public signature campaign further strengthened accountability, with stakeholders committing to prevent child marriage and formally submitting their pledges to the ward office.

As a result, positive changes are now visible in the community. Increased awareness and collective commitment have encouraged community members to question and prevent early marriages. This initiative demonstrates that community-led action and local ownership can effectively challenge harmful practices and strengthen child protection at the grassroots level.

Child/Youth Participation

Empowering Children as Active Agents of Change

Child participation is a key principle of children's rights recognized by the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), which emphasizes the right of children to express their views and take part in decisions affecting their lives. Meaningful participation helps children develop confidence, leadership skills, and a sense of responsibility while enabling communities and institutions to better understand and respond to their needs.

Over the years, Loo Niva has supported the formation and strengthening of child clubs and child club networks, creating safe platforms where children can share their ideas, raise awareness on issues affecting them, and actively engage in community and school-level initiatives.

In 2025, Loo Niva continued to promote child participation through its key initiatives, including the three different programs: child clubs were strengthened, awareness sessions on child rights were conducted, and children were encouraged to participate in social change activities and school initiatives. In particular, 29 child clubs organized more than 100 child-led initiatives, helping raise awareness about education, child protection, and social inclusion.

Through these efforts, Loo Niva continues to empower children to raise their voices, participate in community processes, and contribute to creating safer, more inclusive environments where every child can learn, grow, and reach their full potential.

Strengthening Child Participation through Child Clubs

In Mahankal Rural Municipality, children once had limited opportunities to express their views or influence decisions affecting their lives. Although budgets existed, child participation was largely overlooked, with priority given to infrastructure rather than children's voices.

With the support of Loo Niva and Patan CBR, child clubs were revitalized and strengthened through life skills and leadership training. Gradually, children gained confidence, awareness, and the ability to organize their own activities such as drawing competitions, essay writing, and awareness campaigns on child marriage and the right to education. As children began raising their voices in schools and communities, local stakeholders took notice.

A significant milestone was achieved when Mahankal Rural Municipality started allocating budget for child club activities demonstrating a growing commitment to meaningful child participation and the recognition of children as active agents of change.



Scaling Youth-Led Action Against Child Marriage

Since January 2025, Loo Niva has strategically invested in strengthening youth leadership in Konjyosom, with a vision to transform young people into active agents of social change. At the start of the year, only 16 youth were actively engaged in advocacy efforts against child marriage. Through targeted capacity-building, mentorship, and continuous support, Loo Niva successfully expanded this movement to 36 active youth members.

The SAMANA youth group, supported by Loo Niva, became a central force in mobilizing peers, facilitating community discussions, and taking initiative to report and prevent cases of child marriage.

A key milestone in this journey was the Youth Consultation held in June 2025, facilitated by Loo Niva. This event strengthened coordination among

youth, enhanced their strategic planning skills, and deepened their collective commitment to ending child marriage. It also created space for new members to join and actively contribute, further expanding the group's reach and impact.

As a result of this sustained investment, the youth-led movement in Konjyosom has evolved from a small group into a dynamic and influential network.

This remarkable progress was internationally recognized when the SAMANA youth group received the Operation Daywork Human Rights Award in 2025. This recognition reflects both the dedication of the youth and the effectiveness of Loo Niva's empowerment approach in nurturing confident, capable leaders who drive meaningful social change.



Advocacy, Campaign And Networking

Advocacy, campaign, and networking are key approaches used by Loo Niva to promote children's rights and influence policies and practices affecting their well-being. Through collaboration with government institutions, civil society organizations, and communities, Loo Niva has consistently worked to strengthen accountability, promote inclusive policies, and amplify the voices of marginalized children, particularly in the areas of education, child protection, and participation. In 2025, Loo Niva strengthened its advocacy efforts by facilitating policy dialogues and coordination with local governments and stakeholders, enhancing their understanding and commitment to inclusive education and child protection. Community and school-level awareness campaigns

further engaged parents, teachers, and children, promoting prevention of child marriage, school dropout, and discrimination. Child clubs and youth groups actively contributed to social campaigns, increasing community participation and ownership.

Networking remained central to Loo Niva's work, with continued collaboration with national and local networks such as the Education Watch Group Nepal and other Networks to promote collective action and policy influence. Loo Niva has started an international engagement in Nepal with partners including SAMANA youth group, Operation Day Work, and Future Rights APS Italy for two-way global learning process, reinforcing youth leadership and international solidarity.



Connecting Communities and Global Allies for Change

Loo Niva strengthened its advocacy and networking efforts by facilitating an international engagement in Nepal with partners including the SAMANA youth group, Operation Day Work, and Future Rights APS. This collaboration provided global partners with firsthand insights into community-led initiatives to prevent child marriage in Konjyosom Rural Municipality.

Through strategic meetings, cultural exchange, and field visits to schools, community groups,

and local institutions, the engagement highlighted the impact of youth-led advocacy and strengthened collaboration with local governments and stakeholders. The initiative also contributed to a broader international exchange, creating a two-way platform for learning, solidarity, and joint action.

This experience demonstrated the power of global partnerships in amplifying local voices and advancing collective efforts toward a child marriage-free future.

Research Study, Information, Education And Communication

Research, information dissemination, and communication are important components of Loo Niva's efforts to promote children's rights and inclusive education in Nepal. Through evidence-based research and strategic communication, the organization generates knowledge, inform stakeholders, and contributes to policy dialogue and public awareness. By documenting experiences and sharing lesson learnt, Loo Niva strengthen advocacy, community engagement, and program implementation.

In 2025, Loo Niva conducted several research and documentation initiatives to better understand the challenges related to child rights, education, and protection. A significant milestone was the Mid-Term Evaluation (MTE) of the Community Leadership on Education and Protection (CLEAP) Project, which assessed progress and identified areas for improvement. Similarly, a baseline study of the Safeguarding Futures: Improved Right to Education and Protection of Vulnerable Children in Nepal (REAP) Project was conducted in Mahankal and Konjyosom Rural Municipalities of Lalitpur District to establish key indicators and guide future project interventions.

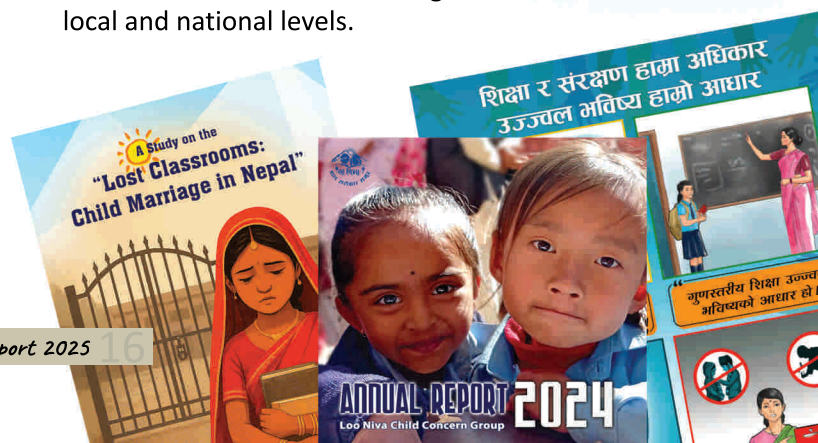
Loo Niva also continued its efforts to document and disseminate knowledge through various communication platforms. The organization

published its Annual Report 2024, highlighting key achievements, lessons learned, and program impacts. In addition, the quarterly Loo Niva E-Newsletter was regularly produced and shared with partners, stakeholders, and supporters, providing updates on ongoing activities, research findings, and future initiatives.

Furthermore, in collaboration with Education Watch Group Nepal, Loo Niva contributed to the publication of the Education Watch Report 2025 titled "Lost Classrooms: Child Marriage in Nepal." The report examined the relationship between child marriage and access to education and aimed to support policy dialogue and advocacy efforts to address this critical issue affecting children in Nepal.

Through these initiatives, Loo Niva reinforced evidence-based advocacy, promote knowledge sharing, and enhance awareness on child rights and inclusive education among stakeholders at local and national levels.

Loo Niva Governance, Management And Capacity Building

Finance And Admins

In 2025, Loo Niva Child Concern Group's Finance and Administration Department ensured strong financial governance, transparency, and accountability across all operations. Managing an annual program budget of approximately USD 235,000, the department maintained robust financial systems for budgeting, financial planning, grant management, and timely staff benefits, ensuring efficient resource utilization in line with organizational priorities.

Regular financial monitoring, reporting, and compliance with national regulations and donor requirements strengthened stakeholder trust and accountability. Public social audits further enhanced transparency by engaging communities and stakeholders in reviewing financial and

program performance. In addition, improved administrative systems, including procurement, asset management, and digital record-keeping, supported smooth organizational functioning. Overall, these efforts reinforced Loo Niva's financial integrity and institutional capacity to effectively deliver its programs.

Capacity Development

In 2025, Loo Niva Child Concern Group prioritized strengthening institutional and human resource capacity to enhance program effectiveness and sustainability. The organization conducted various trainings, orientations, and workshops focusing on project implementation, safeguarding, financial management, and operational planning, ensuring alignment with organizational strategies.

Regular monthly, quarterly, and annual review meetings provided platforms for reflection, accountability, and shared learning. Staff also participated in national and international learning opportunities on key themes such as advocacy, gender-transformative approaches, child protection, disaster risk reduction, and good governance, including the Gender Transformative Approaches and Social Norms training by Girls Not Brides (GNB), Asia Region.

Through continuous learning, knowledge sharing, and strengthened coordination, Loo Niva built a more skilled, confident, and cohesive team, enhancing its capacity to effectively deliver programs and respond to emerging challenges.

Loo Niva Achievements And Learnings

In 2025, Loo Niva made significant strides in promoting inclusive education, child rights, and community empowerment:

- Strengthened **local child protection systems** through reform and orientation of **Local Child Rights Committees (LCRCs)** in project areas.
- Enhanced the **capacity of 110 teachers from 38 schools** through training on child-centered teaching methods and inclusive education practices.
- Promoted inclusive education by supporting the **enrollment of 13 children with disabilities** in schools in Mahankal and Konjyosom Rural Municipalities.
- Provided educational support to **168 vulnerable children**, helping them continue their education through the **Education Support Program (ESP)**.
- Strengthened **29 child clubs and networks**, empowering children to participate in community awareness and social change initiatives.
- Facilitated **102 child-led social change activities**, raising awareness on education, child protection, and social inclusion.
- Conducted community awareness programs reaching **over 2,500 parents** to promote child

rights, protection, and the importance of education.

- Strengthened collaboration with **local governments, schools, and community stakeholders** to improve education governance and child protection mechanisms.
- Promoted environmental education and student participation through **Green School initiatives in 12 schools**.
- Contributed to national advocacy through the **Education Watch Report 2025 on "Lost Classrooms: Child Marriage in Nepal"**, in collaboration with Education Watch Group Nepal.
- **Amplified national advocacy impact** by strategically engaging with government mechanisms and national networks, strengthening a unified and influential collective voice for child rights.
- **Improved the livelihoods of 29 vulnerable families** through targeted income-generation initiatives, directly contributing to increased school access, retention, and well-being of children.
- **Expanded inclusive education and service access** by supporting children with disabilities to continue their schooling and benefit from essential government services.

Key Lessons Learned in 2025

- Strong collaboration with local governments significantly improves the sustainability and effectiveness of child protection and education interventions.
- Community awareness and parental engagement are critical in reducing school dropout and encouraging children, especially girls and marginalized groups, to continue their education.
- Child clubs and youth groups provide powerful platforms for empowering children to raise their voices and contribute to social change in their communities.
- Teacher capacity-building on inclusive education plays an essential role in creating child-friendly and supportive learning environments for all students.
- Early identification and support for vulnerable children, including children with disabilities, helps improve school enrollment and participation.
- Evidence-based research and studies such as baseline studies and evaluations are essential for guiding program design, improving implementation, and informing advocacy efforts.
- Networking and collaboration with civil society organizations and national networks strengthen advocacy efforts and amplify the voices of marginalized communities.
- Regular monitoring, school visits, and mentoring support help identify challenges\ faced by children early and provide timely solutions to prevent school dropout.
- Integrating environmental and extracurricular activities in schools, such as Green School initiatives, increases students' engagement and promotes holistic learning environments.

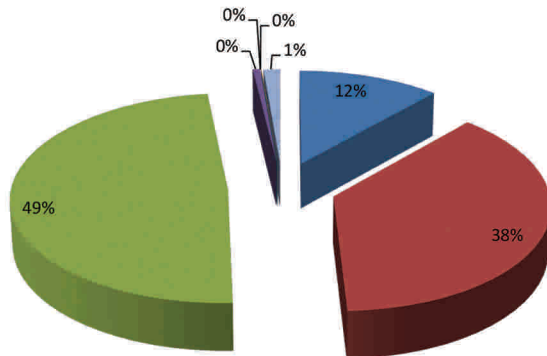

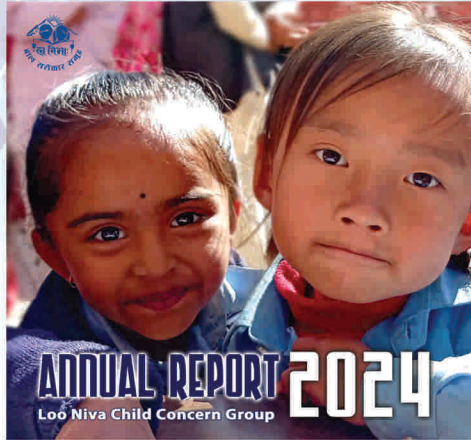
